John W. Lawton, the youngest of four children, was born to the union of Mattie Coney Lawton and Washington Lawton July 31, 1915 in Screven County, Georgia. He was preceded in death by these family members. His early education began in Bulloch County, Georgia. After the family moved to Statesboro, Georgia, John attended William James High School where he was awarded a diploma.

He continued his education at Savannah State College, and in 1938 received the Bachelor of Science degree. John did further study at Atlanta University, Tuskegee Institute and Teachers College of Columbia University from which he was awarded the Masters of Arts degree.

John began his professional career as an agriculture teacher in Bulloch and Morgan Counties. He soon became Principal of the Willow Hill Elementary School in Bulloch County. Active in local, regional and state education affairs, he was elected to the Board of Directors of the Georgia Teachers and Education Association. He also served as Vice President and President of the Association. His work in the field of education was temporarily interrupted from 1943 to 1946 while he served in the U.S. Army.

On June 1, 1944, John married Anne Miller. They moved to Atlanta in 1965 after John was appointed to the staff of the National Education Association as Associate Regional Representative in the Southeast Regional Office.

From early childhood, John had been active in the Methodist Church. He served as Lay Leader for the Central Jurisdiction of the Georgia Conference of United Methodist Churches. He is a Charter member of the Hoosier Memorial United Methodist Church and has served as Lay Leader and Chairman of the PPR Committee.

John served with distinction on several important Boards of Directors; the Mutual Federal Savings and Loan Bank, the NAACP, and the United Methodist Children's Home. He is a life member of the American Teachers Association and the National Educators Association. He is a past president of the Atlanta Metro Lions Club, a member of the Atlanta Senior Golfers, Eta Omega Chapter of Omega Psi Phi Fraternity, the Benningites, The Joymen and the Pine Acres Town and Country Club.

John W. Lawton is survived by his wife of fifty-two years, Mrs. Anne Miller Lawton; nephew, Mr. William Lawton; two aunts, Mrs Gertrude Harris and Mrs. Bessie Canady; sister-in-law, Mrs Shedricka V. Miller; godchildren, Dr. Robert Jennings and Miss Alethia Sykes; and a host of cousins, other relatives and devoted friends.
